According to 2019 Jail Detention Report, the country's total prisons have 18.5 per cent more inmates than the prison's capacity. Of the total inmates in prison, 69.5 percent are subjudice to trial. According to the Commonwealth Human Rights Initiative, there are 500000 prisoners in the country. In states like Chhattisgarh, the number of inmates in jails is two times more than the capacity. Madhurima Dhanuka, head of the CHRC, admitted that more than 18000 prisoners and staff had been infected during the first wave of Corona. Between May 27, 2020 and December 14 2020, 18,157 inmates and prison staff across the country were infected with Covid. Only in Uttar Pradesh, 7000 inmates were infected with Covid last year. ## 'Devsena' extending its roots in Odisha ?

In the peaceful state of Odisha, a communal fundamentalist group called 'Devsena' in the name of Hindutva is trying to create an atmosphere of hatred and violence. Keeping religious fundamentalism on its agenda, the organization continues to train and sell weapons such as swords, blades, knives and shields.

On May 18, 2018, the Devsena registered itself in Faridabad's Haryana district of Ballabgarh, as Brij Bhushan Saini being the president under the Trust Act. According to Brij Bhushan, who claims to have been registered, the trust's By-laws No.3 states that

the training of using weapons will be provided nationwide. The No.7 by-law also mentions the use of these



weapons. The question is, is it not entirely anti-national in India to train

and distribute weapons by an individual or organizations? Such an act is prohibited by the Arms Act of 1959 and the Indian Penal Code. However, in Odisha, the police do not have any information on usage of such swords, knives, weapons, even if the trainings are being conducted. In Odisha, some people like Bamdev Mishra, Biswajit Jena, and Ganeshwar Khatua have opened training camps in different districts, according to the sources. According to Indian law, more than five people are prohibited to gather and take up arms, while the trust has four members. This is completely unconstitutional. The Devsena Trust ...

## End of inequality !

Politics and Governance in India seem to be in the hands of swindlers, crooks and criminals. The financial system is falling down. Opposition leaders and activists are in a state of silence and helplessness. Weak, frustrated and unconscious. Ordinary citizens are now facing a situation of deprivation and discouragement. The goal is to move away from the status quo with respect. Confidence and self-esteem are being shattered. The spread of cows, cow dung, cow urine, Hindurashtra, Hindu-Muslims, India-Pakistan, Ram Rajya Sabha, Ram Mandir, Vishwaguru and world power are now rampant. Modi is the incarnation of God, he is omnipotent, he is the guardian, he is the emperor of the Hindu heart, and he is the Supreme Personality. Worship and debate about him but do not criticize him, or else you are anti-national. Disagreements and arguments have not found a place in the country. Even though hunger, poverty, unemployment and inequality are at an all-time high in the country, the government does not consider it their constitutional duty to address this. The concept of national development does not seem to be on the government's agenda. It has been seen that the development of capitalists and corporate houses is a major responsibility for the government. Health and economic problems, as well as social and humanitarian problems, continue to plague rural and urban areas. Recently, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said in his mindset that he would transform India from 'Scam India' to 'Skill India'. But today, as inequality rises and the problem continues to rise, India is set to become a corporate India. The pace of 'crony capitalism' is growing. As a result, social and human inequalities have increased, both economically and socially.

Today, amidst the second wave of corona pandemic, the citizens are facing such an agonizing & bizarre situation that it shows how threatening discrimination and imparity can be. According to some people, the plague that stormed the country 100 years ago has now recurred. But it is important to note that there is a big difference between the healthcare infrastructure existing 100 years ago & in the current situation. Medical science has transformed drastically in the country and around the world in these 100 years. The country has also been plagued by epidemics such as malaria, cholera, and encephalitis. Vaccines have also been developed for some diseases and some others are being researched upon. The Corona outbreak was first reported on January 30, 2020 in Kerala, India. This is where the first infected patient was identified. According to official statistics, average of 400000 people in India have died from the second wave of the pandemic so far. As per the non-official statistics, the death toll is estimated to be more than 30 lakh. The cause of death was Covid infection. Media, social media, newspapers, newspapers are reporting that there is a shortage of essential health care equipment, such as hospital, oxygen and life-saving drugs. According to a report released by the CDDEP(The Centre for Disease Dynamics, Economics & Policy) in April 2020, there are a total of 69264 hospitals in the country. Out of these total hospitals, there are 25778 government and 43286 private hospitals. There are a total of 899227 beds in public hospitals, while private hospitals have 1185241 beds. Government hospitals have 35,700 ICU beds, while private hospitals have 59264 ICU beds. Government hospitals have 17850 ventilators, while private hospitals have 29631 ventilators. These figures prove that most of the health infrastructure in the country is privatized. A review of the statistics shows that 5 beds per 10000 people are available in the public sector and 9 beds in the private sector. This inequality in health care is a reflection of the government's incompetence. In the financial sector, the handful of people are increasing their money or capital, while the purchasing power of 80 percent is declining. People need to be mobilized against this inequality, and we must continue to protest against the government's misguided policies. Without it, inequality will not end.

## Cattle politics !

In the past, many attempts have been made to make the secular India a Hindu nation. To this end, efforts are being made to gradually change the constitution of the country and to unite the Hindus in the

name of religion. Religious minorities and oppressed communities are being targeted and persecuted by raising the voice of religious extremism. Where the innocent people are being attacked because of the slogan of 'Jay Shree Ram.' As religious intolerance escalates in the country, the government's failure to pay any special attention to it poses a threat to democracy. Hinduism in particular believes that the cow is the mother; cow is believed to be inhabited by thirty-three crore gods and goddesses & considers cow's urine to be sacred. Campaigns for declaration of cow as national animal and a ban on cow slaughter. To this end, many Hindu organizations have been formed in the country under the name of 'Gau-Suraksha'. Most cases of violence are reported. The Hindus complain that the people of the minority community are setting up many slaughterhouses to produce beef eaters and collect cows from different areas and cut the cows in that slaughterhouse. In fact, according to baseless allegations, in Hinduism, many Dalits and tribals eat beef, while Hindus own many slaughterhouse in our country, but hundreds of Muslims, including Mohammad Aklak, Pahlu Khan, and Rakbar Khan, are killed in the name of cow protection. No cattle protection group or Hindutva organization has protested against those who open companies in the name of Muslims and kill many cows there every day and export beef to produce meat skins. According to the Vivek Saxena report, the owners of the four largest companies in the country are Hindu companies, namely Al-Kabir (Satish

and Atul Shabarwal), Arabian (Sunil Karan), and MKR Frozen Foods (Madan Ebat) and also they receive much appreciation. In 2014-15, the government provided

a subsidy of Rs 15 crore for the construction of new slaughter plants and the modernization of old ones to encourage beef production. As a result, India exported 2.6 million tonnes of meat in 2014-15, accounting for 58.7% of the world's exported meat. According to a video released by ABP News on April 23, 2014, Prime Minister Narendra Modi has admitted that many members of his party are trading in beef production in Gujarat. After Modi coming into power, beef production has increased from 16,500 tonnes to 22,000 tonnes. This indicates the government has paved its way for supporters of beef. According to a report in the Hindustan Times, BJP MLA Sangeet Som and two others bought land for the Meat Processing Unit in Aligarh in 2009. Sangeet Som is the legislator who came forward to help the family of accused arrested in the Dadri Masjid case. According to the newspaper, the Firebrand BJP leader Sangeet Som is one of the directors of Al Dua Food Processing Private Limited along with Moinuddin Qureshi and Yogesh Rawat, and bought land for the company.

Coming to the BJP government in 2014 is the highest rate of beef production in the country. Violence in the name of cattle protection has also escalated. If we look at the BJP-ruled state of Uttar Pradesh, there has been a lot of violence in the name of cattle protection here. 50 year old Mohammad Aklak & his 22-year-old son and other family members were also seriously beaten up for consuming beef. In 2016, a Dalit family attacked seven members of a Dalit cow near Unna town in Giri Somnath...

reports of prisoners being infected in prisons. Seventeen inmates are said to have succumbed to Covid.

As of May 24, 2000, the total number of pending court cases in India was 324.5 lakh, according to the National Judicial Data Grid. Of these, 9.045 lakh are civil cases and 233.9 lakh are pending criminal cases. Thirty-two percent of these cases are more than one year old. 28 percent of cases are pending from last 1 to 3 years, and 15 percent of cases pending from last 3 to 5 years. 15.28 percent of cases are of 5 to 10 years old, and 7.1 percent of cases pending in court are pending for more than 10-20 years. On one hand, inmates in prisons are afflicted with suffering, and on the other hand, millions of cases are pending in court. The trial does not end. Citizens have been serving prison terms for years. Politicians are also serving life in prison on false charges, such as the UPA and treason.

of Faridabad, Haryana State, is forming an organization in Odisha. But the Home Department does not seem to have any information about it. In a peaceful state like Odisha, the accumulation & sale of firearms and its training in the name of religion are certainly dangerous news. A person named Ghenu Mangaraj is trying to collaborate the organization from Haryana with Odisha and is selling arms and ammunitions to youths in Odisha. When the civil society is fighting to save itself from the Corona pandemic, the Devsena has been launched in the name of Hinduism, monotheism & Religious exclusivism. Its members have focused on imparting training of weapons. Conscious and aware citizens have demanded that the organization be declared illegal immediately and that members involved in the treason case be arrested.

### Flawed health...

January till last month May 5, 803 children have died. Seeing this number, there are allegations of medical negligence. There have been allegations that the treatment of suspected Covid cases is being hampered. This is because the Shishu Bhavan has been declared as non-dedicated Covid care hospital. Covid is not treated here. Only a SARI ward (Severe Acute Respiratory Illness) has been

opened here for children with suspected covid illness. Children with fever, cold and cough symptoms are being admitted to this ward for covid test. Babies who are tested positive with Covid are being referred to the Covid Unit at SCB Medical, Cuttack. The SCB has special wards and ICUs for pediatric patients. So it has become a matter of concern that so many infant deaths have been reported even without covid treatment at Shishu Bhavan. Doctors say it is a referral center. Children with complex illnesses come here from different locations. Most infants who are underweight, newborns with birth defects die, and some children die of encephalitis, septicaemia, pneumonia, and heart problems within the age of five years. The bottom line is that all critically ill patients come here too late, with more than five children dying here a day, doctors said. According to the report, 202 children died at Shishu Bhavan last January, while 151 died in February, 171 in March, 144 in April and 145 in May. More than seven children died here daily in January, while the average daily death toll is said to be more than five. It is being said that, with the absence of modern health care facility many deaths are taking place, thus, when special covid care facility would have here then it would have caused less worry.

According to social workers, proper treatment is not done here along with providing various excuses. This has led to allegations of medical negligence at various times. In the first week of June, an unfortunate situation arose in the hospital following the death of a child. The family of the deceased child complained of medical negligence. A few days ago, there was an incident in which a doctor was pushed and harassed for the death of a child. It was revealed that the death of 51 children in a span of 10 days at the hospital in August 2015 had become a hot topic in the national media. Several central leaders, including Congress leader Rahul Gandhi, visited state-run Shishu Bhavan and frequent meetings of ministerial officials to discuss the issue. A number of doctors, including the then hospital superintendent and administrative officer, were later transferred and some staff were suspended. However, given the current situation, it is clear that there has been little change in

mortality. "There is no truth to the allegations of medical negligence," said Dr Jananindra Behera, superintendent of the Shishu Bhavan, in this regard. "How can we say deaths are more? This rate is normal."

and a half since he is living in a relative's house and spending time with brothers and sisters. Before Bhima could see and understand the world, the hapless boy has been forced to fight for survival. However, Bhima has a desire for educating himself and his siblings. He also endured the hunger starvation with the aim of continuing his studies. The juvenile from Pulapali village under Mathili Block Vejaput panchayat in Malkangiri district is just waiting for good opportunities and support. Bhima lost his mother, Chandrama less than four years ago. After that, Ram Pula father of the juvenile quit his job. The father left the children at home less than three years ago due to work being lost & mental illness. No further contact was established. The villagers and relatives searched for Ram as there was no one else to help the helpless young child but he was not found. This was followed by the miserable lives of Bhima, sister Basanti (13), Sabita (11) and brother Shiva (9). All the brothers and sister lived in house of grand father and uncle. The last 3 years have been cut short by various shortcomings and difficulties. Bhima is currently a 10th class student at Padmagiri High School. Sister Basanti is studying seventh grade at Chauliguda School. Sabita is in the sixth grade at Thapaguda School while the younger brother Shiva is in the fourth grade at Papaliguda School. Most of the day, however, was spent in school hostels, without any problems. But since last year, everyone has been forced to return to the village as the hostel has been closed due to corona. After that, the complete responsibility of the siblings shouldered by Bhima. In the name of government assistance, only 20 kg of rice is provided per month. These brothers & sisters have to depend on others for two square meals a day. The villagers are worried about the future of these children, who are deprived of parents' love & affection. The villagers said it would have been better if they had received any government assistance.

# Profits amidst pandemic : Make hay while the sun shines !

The Corona pandemic in the world has caused more damage to human livelihood and economy than human life and health. Millions of people have lost their livelihoods; with mills, factories; businesses and commerce shutting down for months, as governments and other countries around the world have been locked up and shut down for months, especially in the name of fighting the pandemic. In our country, although the central government has not declared any hasty and unplanned shutdowns in the ongoing pandemic like last year, the shutdowns & lockdowns by various state governments have adversely affected the country's economy and livelihood.

While the country has not been able to recuperate from the financial crisis caused by the first wave of Corona, the second wave has devastated the economy. As a result of the financial crisis, the common man has become more poor, while millions of middle-class families in the country have also moved into the poorer classes. A recent review by Azim Premji University found that the number of poor people in rural areas in the country has increased by 15% as a result of the pandemic, while in the city it has increased by 20%. In a span of one year since the pandemic, a total of

23 crore people in the country have been forced into poverty.

According to a review report by the 'Center for Monitoring Indian Economy' (CMIE), the pandemic has reduced the income of 97% of Indian households. Unemployment in the country rose by 12% in May. In the five months since January to May, 3.5 crore labourers and employees in the country lost their jobs, while in the month of May itself, 2.5 crore jobs were lost. It also said that most workers in the country which had the ability to stand up to catastrophe during the last year's pandemic has also ended now after another wave of the pandemic.

Surprisingly, the pandemic has been devastating for most people in the country, but for big corporate owners it's been like making hay while the sun shines. The income levels of large corporate companies in the country, such as Ambani and Adani, have skyrocketed during the pandemic. In a recent review by the international research organization Huron Global, data show how the owners of Indian corporate companies have increased their wealth and profits during the pandemic. Last January, the international organization Oxfam said in a report that a significant increase in corporate income during the pandemic had increased the economic inequality

in the country. According to a review by Huron Global, 40 Indian industrialists have joined the World's Billionaires Club with growth in their fortunes by taking advantage of the last pandemic. India's industrial group, which ranks third in the list of billionaires in the world, has risen to 177.

Mukesh Ambani and Gautam Adani, two of Prime Minister Modi's closest industrialists, top the list in terms of wealth growth in the country. Ambani's wealth has increased by 24% in the past one year to a total of 83 billion dollars. The wealth of industrialist Gautam Adani, has sky-rocketed during the Modi government, has doubled in the year of the pandemic. Adani, ranked forty eighth in the world's richest, now has a net worth of 32 billion dollars. Not only that, but his brother Binod Adani's fortune has risen by 128% to 9.8 billion dollar, while Shiv Nadar, the owner of the country's third-richest IT company HCL, has risen from 10 billion US dollars to 27 US billion dollars. Company Zscaler's head Jay Choudhury's wealth has risen 274%, while for 'Byju' Rabindranath and his family's wealth have risen by 100%. Narayan Murthy, the owner of Infosys, grew 35% to \$ 3.1 billion.

Amidst the pandemic, country's economic activity has plummeted, domestic trade has declined and, above all, the GDP growth rate has fallen by 7.3% instead of rising. During the same time, corporate profits have skyrocketed. In fact, they have not only continued to grow their profits, but have also increased them by 14.7% as compared to the previous year. While huge number of workers lost their jobs due to the lockdown, the profits of the corporate have increased. According to the CMIE, the number of 4406 registered companies on the stock exchange in the country has increased by 212.4% in their profits compared to the previous year. During the second quarter of the year, the total profit of the above companies was Rs 1.53 lakh crore. In the third quarter (October-December), the profit was Rs 1.53 lakh crore, while in the fourth quarter it was Rs 1.8 lakh crore. However, with a total of 975 corporate reports received in the fourth quarter, it is expected to increase further. According to the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), the reduction in labour costs in the first three quarters increased by 33.4% and 35.6%, respectively, in corporate profits in the second and third quarters. In the 2020-21 fiscal year, mills in the country were shut down for months due to pandemic. Due to the months of transportation issues along the closure of shops and markets,

the supply and sale of goods has also been suspended. In this case, the production and sales of the companies had declined Or rather say, it was natural that the decline would occur. The lion's share of its production capacity remained unused as the mills were closed for a long time during the pandemic. There was even a decline in sales due to a lack of demand in the market or a decline in purchasing power. In that sense, it is possible the company could have lost its profits. But the differing companies have made huge

profits.

However, the rise in corporate profits has not played a key role in boosting employment in the country. On one hand, corporate profits are on the rise in the country, while employment is on the decline. At a time when the lives of ordinary people are at stake during the pandemic and people are forced to live under house arrest without being able to go to work due to the strict rules of lockdowns, the capitalists have made extensive cuts to reduce their labour costs. They were well aware that workers could not protest because of the lockdown.

The main reason behind corporate skyrocketing profits was the exploitation of the value of workers 'exorbitant labour. Those who could not return to work due to lay off were replaced by new worker and were paid less than before. In this way, Corporates were able to significantly reduce costs in their labour accounts. As a result of the pandemic, 3.5 crore workers lost their jobs in the first five months of this year, while 1.5 crore people lost their jobs in May itself.

In a recent report, the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) said in a statement that despite the "severe economic crisis" in the country, corporations have been able to maintain their profits by reducing labour costs. They have been able to reduce the cost of their wages by relentlessly hiring workers, reducing wages, hiring temporary workers instead of permanent workers, and increasing labour hours. In the first quarter of the 2020-21 fiscal year, corporate cut their spending on their work accounts by 34%. Earlier, if Rs 50 was labour cost on product of Rs.100, today it has been

reduced to Rs 33. Similarly, in the second and third quarters of the year, corporations have been able to reduce their labour costs by 12.5%. This means that the fact that corporate have reduced their production costs by cheap labour during the pandemic has added to their net profit.

Corporates, on the other hand, have lowered production costs but have not reduced the price of their products. In contrast, the prices of all industrial products, from edible oils to pharmaceuticals, have risen sharply. This means that Corporates have looted more profits by increasing sales prices.

Recently, the former governor of the Reserve Bank of India, Dr. Subarao expressed concern over the plight of the poor, while the rich became richer. The country's GDP growth rate is -7.3% due to the pandemic. The loss of jobs as a result of the pandemic has led to increased health care costs for most people, which is one of the main reasons for the increase in poverty. However, the decline in the income of the country's poor and the skyrocketing increase in the income and consent of the rich and corporate have increased the economic inequality in society. He warned that such an increase in the economic situation of the people would lead the country towards social and political chaos. He encouraged ordinary people as well to take part in solving this great task: "One of the things you and other people can do is keeping up the pressure ... there are going to be some difficult decisions for government"

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## Child labourers more than doubled during lockdown: Survey

Bhubaneswar (Bureau): It has been 24 years since the census of child labour took place in the state. Last survey was done in 1997 in which the computation showed there were 2.5 lakh child labourers. This number is now so high due to Corona effects and lockdowns. The situation of child labourers is even more serious. Sandhyabati Pradhan, chairperson of the Child Rights Protection Commission, said the state government would propose to compute the number of child labourers separately. This was discussed at a meeting jointly sponsored by Action-Aid, UNICEF, and the State Child Protection Commission on the occasion of World Child Labour Day.

The number of orphans in the second wave of corona is growing alarmingly. Such children were ordered to appear before the Child Welfare Committee,



but in many cases they were neglected. Most of them are not accommodated in child care centre but rather they are living with relatives. In financially disadvantaged families, children are starting to earn in risky and unsafe situations to help relatives. The schools have been closed for more than a year due to corona. As a result, many students are

earning a living. In addition, the financial standards of most families are severely hampered. The children work in various hotels, shops, factories to help the family. Child trafficking is on the rise. This consists of both girls and boys.

The Child Commission said some child labourers were rescued at hotels last year. The own-

ers were luring them in various ways as they are underpaid. The state government will propose a special placement of dangerous, non-hazardous, agricultural workers in the number of child labour surveys. It was also alleged at the meeting that there was a child labour task force in each district but unexecuted. Even its meetings are not regular. There is also a need to strengthen child protection committees set up at the panchayat level to deal with the current pandemic.

The meeting was attended by Divya Shaswati, Member of the Commission for the Protection of the Rights of the Child, Debabrata Patra, Regional Director, Action Aid, Ghasiram Panda, Action Aid, Sadashiv Swain, Secretary, Center for Child and Women Development, Neha Naidu, UNICEF.

## Dangria : A road to nowhere, bump in the road !

Nuapadha (Bureau): Many years have passed since Independence. However, the scene of some areas has not changed. The picture of the development of many regions has become a farce. Both the central and state governments are working hard to provide basic services such as health, education and transportation in remote Maoist-influenced areas. But that remains only as a proposal. Many villagers are still deprived of access to basic services. We are talking about the isolated Mandapakhana village in Gorla village panchayat of Nuapadha district. For these netizens, access to proper roads has become distant dream. The villagers are walking on roads filled with crater and potholes. Most of the roads are mere mud tracks. The village of Mandapakhana is far away from progress.

The Dangria community live in the dense forests surrounded by hills, deep gorges and cascading streams. A narrow road in the middle of the hill, which is filled with potholes. And in the pouring

rain, the ditch is filled with water. The condition of the road is completely different, especially when it rains. Due to the accumulation of water in the ditch, it is impossible to commute in four

wheeler or two wheeler vehicles. A patient has to be carried on the shoulders to be taken to the hospital. Not only that, but the Dangria family is often trapped on rainy days. On a rainy day, the Armela check dam canal overflows with water. The strong current of the canal river keeps the village of Mandapakhana in confinement.

The villagers are suffering from lack of good roads. There is no school, no path to walk down. Despite repeated appeals to the administration, the administration has not paid any heed to it. The villagers have demanded the construction of a bridge for a better road. The plan is to build a bridge over the canal at a cost of Rs 30 lakh soon, the BDO said. Pradesh, Rajasthan, Haryana and Punjab, have enacted strict laws to ban cattle slaughter. States such as West Bengal, Kerala, Meghalaya, Nagaland and Tripura, however, have not banned cattle slaughter, and cows and sheep in states like Odisha, Assam, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana and Tamil Nadu where cattle are of no use are only eligible for slaughter. Such law is called partial prohibition.

According to Article 48 of the Constitution, the state shall promote agriculture and animal husbandry in a modern and scientific manner, as well as the

protection of dairy animals (cows, sheep, etc.). It was enshrined in the 1950 Act, after which most states enacted laws in their respective states in 1955. In the Rajya Sabha, MP Subramanian Swamy has already passed the Gau-Suraksha Act 2017, and Mohan Bhagwat, head of the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh, has launched a nationwide campaign called Gau-Suraksha. Goa Chief Minister Pramod Sawant pledged to reduce the beef crisis by importing beef from other states during the Christmas period. Be aware of what the BJP and its approach have been to cow protection, which means that they have started a campaign in the name of cow protection, claiming that muslims are eating beef, and that it is only for politics. In support of this, the Gau-Suraksha Samiti, the Bajrang Dal, the Vishwa Hindu Parishad and other organizations are reportedly causing most of the violence in the name of Gau-Suraksha.

# Vaccination study: adverse effects

New Delhi: As of June 7, 2021 23.5 crore people across the country had been vaccinated against Corona disease. As many as 26,200 people were seen to having adverse effects of the vaccine. If it is displayed as a percentage, it is only about 0.01 percent. Vaccinations are now being carried out across the country to defeat the Corona virus pandemic. According to official figures, 488 people have died across the country since June 7, while 24,000 people were reported to have contracted with serious side effects. In the language of science, this is called the 'Adverse Event following Immunization'



(AEFI). Likewise such data are collected in each country. If these numbers are taken care of, in the future such adverse effects of vaccine could be averted.

Cases of serious side effects are rare: According to the data available so far, Covaxin of India Biotech and Covishield of Serum Institute of India, 0.1% of these vaccines have AEFI cases. Experts believe that, according to estimates, both the death toll and the AEFI cases are very low. Experts recommend using the vaccine in this case. So far, more than 300,000 people have died in India due to the Corona pandemic. In this case, vaccine is the only real and powerful weapon to defeat Corona.

## Where is the government assistance ? Future of orphans in catastrophic state !

Joda (Bureau): An unfortunate incident has been reported in Dubuna of Badkalimati panchayat under Joda mining area. One child after another, three children have been orphaned after the death of their parents, and their future is now in the dark. Karthik Sethi's wife died of an unknown disease four years ago, while Karthik has been taking care of his three children. But fate has threatened his family. In less than seven days, Karthik Sethi aged 55, died of an unknown disease. His three children, the eldest daughter Ambika is only 17 years old, the youngest daughter Shravani is 15 years old and the youngest son Shравan Kumar is only 8 years old. The father used to make a living by cleaning the clothes in other homes and arranging food for the children by



earning two rupees per month. However, after his death, the three children are now completely helpless & orphaned. They also have no money for conducting the funeral rites of their father, while some locals & some social organizations have extended a helping hand to them. Later, they were looking for a way to survive, while their three brothers and sisters were struggling for survival in their father's mud-brick

house. While they have not yet received any government assistance, Himadri Naik and Ras Bihari Mahant have returned from the Champua Child Care Center, with the assurance them that they will be helping out soon. However, there is a growing demand and appeal by the intellectuals for the government to extend a helping hand to these three orphans.
